

## Woodlands Web

Anyone who drives north up the A32, crosses the traffic lights and then turns left towards Alresford will find themselves in the ancient hamlet of Woodlands. Now a community of 35 households with more than 100 residents, Woodlands is home to a Victorian model farm designed by architect George Crickmay (with whom Thomas Hardy practised, when he wasn't writing novels), a schoolhouse, a chapel and a coaching inn and store. Most of the original buildings still stand, apart from numbers 3 to 10 of the original 16 Woodlands cottages.

Woodlands lies within the Northbrook Farms estate, and the fields, mature trees and hedgerows, verges, thickets, coppices, ponds, gardens and disused chalk pits collectively offer





a rich variety of habitats for flora and fauna.

In spite of this, Woodlands, in common with national trends, has suffered biodiversity loss, with significant decline noted in the incidence of some species. Of particular concern to residents have been the decline in numbers of hedgehogs, swallows, swifts, house martins, cuckoos, bee, butterfly and moth species, amphibians and plants such as cowslip. As elsewhere in Hampshire, local beekeepers have struggled to keep their bees alive over the winter and all those who regularly walk the lanes are concerned by the way bracken is spreading along the verges at the expense of the smaller species which are more typical of chalk habitats. The likely causes of this loss are not unfamiliar and reflect the national conversation around such issues; climate change, habitat loss, herbicide/pesticide use and increases in road traffic numbers, unaware driver behaviour and speed along Woodlands' lanes have most likely all played their part.

As a result of their concerns, Woodlands' residents have joined together to address these issues and have established a 'constituted community conservation group' known as Woodlands WEB. The aims of the group focus on bringing the community together to enrich habitats and connectivity between them for wildlife, thereby enhancing the biodiversity and stability of this local ecosystem.

Initial efforts focused on bringing the community together and included the distribution of a colourful leaflet explaining the aims of the group, accompanied by a gift of wildflower seed donated by the Parish Pollinator Pledge project. Planting wildflower seed, especially for plants attractive to pollinators, has had encouraging results in terms of insect numbers in the short term. Next steps will involve surveying the abundance of flora and fauna already present in the area with particular focus on the 'notable species' identified by Hampshire Biodiversity Information Centre. These are species that data suggests are in significant decline in Hampshire. All survey data will go into the Hampshire Living Record and will establish a baseline against which all future surveys can be measured – hopefully demonstrating uplift in numbers, though we are told that simply maintaining 2024 figures over time will be seen as success.

As part of this process, Hampshire Bat Group surveyed our 2023 bat population using Audiomoth detectors. Seven species were found to be present, including the globally rare Barbastelle. This was exciting news and means that it will be easier to focus on improving habitats for roosting, breeding and hibernating. Many residents have also been concerned about the decline in hedgehog numbers and so increasing connectivity between gardens and the provision of hedgehog 'homes' as well as signage notifying drivers of the risk of hedgehogs in the road are all ongoing projects.

Woodlands' verges and banks sustain at least 8 species of plant indicative of quality habitat but have become eroded and degraded by traffic over recent years. Woodlands residents aim to restore these by improving wildflower coverage, protecting vulnerable tree roots, enhancing food source availability for pollinators, improving access to food and habitat for our resident field voles, harvest mice, weasels and hedgehogs and creating a safe refuge for wildlife and pedestrians from drivers. Our local South Downs National Park ranger has offered some advice on how best to do this.

Since the 1990s, ponds in protected landscapes such as the South Downs National Park have lost 25% of their specialist plant species which then has a knock on effect on the animals dependent on those plants. The Woodlands' pond is at least 150 years old and we believe it is one of a number of storm water retention ponds built along this western stretch of downland,

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
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assisting in flood prevention further down in the base of the valley where the A272 makes its way. South Downs National Park (SDNP) has offered support and is currently exploring commissioning a pond consultant to help us understand the current value of the pond and what can be done to enhance it.

Woodlands is home to a number of small thickets and copses which function as havens and stepping stones across the landscape for wildlife. Our enthusiastic and committed members hope to make improved provision for bats, our notable red and amber list bird species (little owl, mistle thrush, spotted flycatcher), dormice, hedgehog and harvest mouse, drawing on the expertise of Hampshire Bat Group, Hampshire Dormouse Group and Hampshire and IOW Wildlife Trust. Community nest box building workshops are planned for these birds and mammals. We intend to monitor the presence of various species with mammal footprint tunnels and trail cameras, with the aim of inspiring Woodlands' children and young people with a fascination and wish to care for the natural world.

Woodlands is linked to West Meon village by the 'parish path'. Through volunteers assisting Northbrook Farms with enriched parish path margin management, comprising wildflower planting (supported by the Parish Pollinator Pledge) and bee banks, we hope we may be able to improve habitat and food sources for pollinators along much of its length, making the parish path a joy to amble along on its route south towards Shutts Copse and West Meon, whilst at the same time creating a pollinator highway.

Whilst all of this will take time and energy, we know that the determination of our community to make a difference is equal to the task! Moreover, we intend to have fun (and eat plenty of cake) as we pull together on the various projects – truly appreciating our beautiful surroundings at the north end of West Meon parish. *Hilary Otter and Hilary Hickmore*

## **Rainfall December to January**

December 2023 ended with 134.9mms (5.31") giving us a total for the year of 1249.9mms (49.2"). This was the third highest yearly rainfall since we started recording in 1974. I thought that you might like to see an interesting comparison of the wettest, driest, 50 year average and last year's rainfall as below.

January so far has given 61mms of which 33mms fell on the 4th. On this day the Environment Agency issued a flood warning for the river Meon between East Meon and Mislingford. But we have had 11 days without rain and on the 16th and 17th January we recorded a minimum temperature of -8C.



## Is it a waxwing winter?

The waxwing is an undeniably beautiful bird. It's a touch smaller than a starling, with a pleasingly plump body. Its silky feathers are soft hues of grey, brown and apricot, with some stylish accessories. There's a bright yellow band across the end of the tail, white and yellow dashes on the wings, and a black patch on the throat and above the beak, which sweeps back through the eye and up, like the perfect winged eyeliner.

Waxwings are winter visitors, travelling here from Scandinavia when the food supply there runs low, typically residing here until early spring. Another big part of their appeal is that their arrival is never guaranteed. Some winters, we might only see a handful across the country. In others, there can be flocks of hundreds of birds. An influx like this is called an 'irruption'. These years are known as 'waxwing winters' and they don't come around very often.

It all comes down to berries. Waxwings love them. Poor berry crops in Finland and Sweden have apparently pushed waxwings much further than usual this year, and with a berry bonanza reported across the country this autumn, Britain looks set to enjoy its biggest 'Waxwing winter' for at least a decade.

In Hampshire, waxwings are not seen every year, they are a rare visitor. One of the largest irruptions in Hampshire was in the winter of 2010 when over 2,000 birds arrived. However, when they do turn up, it might not be where you'd expect.

One of the waxwing's endearing quirks is that they regularly turn up in urban areas, particularly the car parks of supermarkets and shopping centres. These commercial areas are often planted with ornamental trees with aesthetically pleasing, berry-laden fruit trees – and

these always prove popular with hungry waxwings.

But it seems not all berries are equal in the eyes of a waxwing. Red ones appear to be the most in-demand, including cotoneaster, viburnum, hawthorn and particularly rowan. As stocks of these are depleted, they'll settle for orange or yellow berries, or white berries like mistletoe.

Waxwings are chatty and their pleasant high-pitched trills, which they use to call to each other with, provide one of the best ways to help detect them. Fittingly for a winter visitor, the sound is often likened to soft, jingling sleigh bells.

The Hampshire and Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust is one of 46 Wildlife Trusts in Great Britain, all standing up for the natural world. Together they are the nation's most active and influential nature conservation partnership, protecting wildlife in every part of the British Isles. Each Trust works within its local community to inspire people and bring about change. With the invaluable support of volunteers and members the Hampshire and Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust manage over 60 nature reserves. They also work with other organisations and landowners to protect and connect wildlife sites across the county and inspire local communities and young people to care for wildlife where they live.

Managed nature reserves in our area include Chappetts Copse and Shutts Copse - both barely a mile from the centre of West Meon.

Chappetts Copse is home to an impressive variety of rare plants and fungi including the narrow-leaved helleborine, bird's-nest orchid, silver-washed fritillary and speckled wood butterflies and a healthy population of dormice nestled beneath ash and beech trees. Chappetts Copse was given to the Trust in 1981 by Edith Whitehead and can be found up Coombe Lane at OS Map reference SU 653 234.



Shutts Copse is a broadleaved woodland with ancient hazel coppice at Brockwood Bottom. It was given to the Trust in the late 1980's as a gift in the Will of the late Honourable Miss Joane Dutton. The reserve is scattered with mature oak trees and during the spring it is carpeted with primroses and bluebells. Great

spotted woodpeckers can be heard and occasionally seen with the coal tits, tawny owl and mistle thrush. There are also dormice here. You can find it off Polly Glover's Lane at OS Map Reference SU637261.



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
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## West Meon Community Cinema

#### Salt Bins

#### Flooding in West Meon

#### Hampshire County Council Consultation on bus services

HCC propose to withdraw their subsidy from the 67 bus that serves West Meon between Petersfield and Winchester. They propose to withdraw support for ALL services excepting the morning and afternoon school bus. This would mean that the parish would lose any service during the late morning and early afternoon, thereby stopping use of the bus by Bus Pass holders and those wanting to travel to either Petersfield or Winchester or Alresford.
