

Looking To The Light

It was just four short years ago that Easter had been cancelled as a celebration and churches had been closed. However, we gathered in the street to bang our saucepans in thanksgiving for the saving work of the NHS. We were looking forward to better times; reducing 'r-rates' put hope in our hearts, but still we feared the much discussed 'second spike'. There may be some Easter parallels here for the Christian - a tangible insight into the pain and joy of the Easter story, as we progress through the Easter season to Pentecost (Whitsun).

The first followers of 'The Way' and their leader Yeshua ben Yousef (Jesus), had faced many challenges, but they were as nothing when compared to the events of that first Good Friday. Early on the morning of the third day, many of the disciples remained despondent, they could not even dare to hope that Jesus was alive. However, as the reports of the resurrection found their way to them, several, and not least the women, became euphoric on hearing the news of Jesus' triumphant conquest over death itself, having given his life to save ours.

Despite the resurrection joy, those early followers remained fearful; frightened that they too might lose their lives. The fishermen among them returned to their homes. Despite the exuberance in the wake of the lifting of the first lock-down, we feared what could still happen to us. When we glimpsed signs of the efficacy of the vaccines, our spirits lifted, tentatively at first. The disciples' spirits gradually lifted as reports of Jesus' appearances increased in number.





Uncertainty remained for us even in the latter stages of the pandemic; uncertainty lay ahead of the disciples as Jesus warned them of his departure from their sight.

The effect of the pandemic cast an enormous, dark shadow over the whole world; the pain for so many has been quite unlike anything else that most of us have ever experienced. The death on the cross of Jesus also brought darkness. It must have shattered those who gave up their livelihoods to follow him; it must have brought utter despair to those who had been filled with hope by his teaching and by the way he treated even the marginalized; it surely enraged those who thought he would raise an army and cast the Romans out of Judaea; and it must have brought profound grief to those who loved him.

The horrific statistics of the pandemic were not the end of the CoViD-19 story – vaccinations, medication and wonderful care reversed the progress of this virus – the science and the humanity of our medical professionals brought us hope. For Christians, Good Friday is not the end of the story. Easter Day, and all that it commemorates, still brings hope, light, and life into our broken world. We should never take for granted the joy at the news that the stone had been rolled away of that 1st century tomb as it its occupant had risen.

It was not so long ago that communities, like ours, brought light, joy and comfort out of the darkness of the pandemic. We, and especially the youngest among us, are still building up our lives after the lasting effects of the pandemic, and how much better happens when we work to help one another.

New meaning can emerge after times of sadness, pain, and loss. There is the real hope of joy and companionship with each other before God at such times. Gratitude for the new light and the new life means that we remember what has been, but we remain hopeful and become strengthened for what lies ahead.

May all that we have learned in the pandemic about ourselves and each other, about hope and compassion, never be forgotten, just as God never forgets us, sending his own Son to suffer and die and rise again for us. Out of that suffering came The Light of the World, I pray for light and joy for every one of you and for all those that you love through the whole season of Easter this year and evermore.

Why do toads cross roads?

During breeding season frogs and toads naturally try to migrate back to the bodies of water where they originally spawned so they can mate and lay eggs. Unfortunately, manmade structures like roads and fences can provide difficult obstacles for wildlife to cross over, especially as they grow into larger adults and are unable to slip back through the holes they first came through. It is estimated that a staggering 20 tonnes of toads are killed on UK roads every year.

During February, Hampshire & Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust rescued 170 toads and 7 frogs, thanks to the efforts of the Swanwick Lakes Education and Engagement team.

The team carefully collected and counted the toads and frogs, including mating pairs, from along a security fence line. They were then safely released onto the other side of the fence to continue their migration to their breeding grounds, and so are now able to spawn the next generation.

Frogs are both predators and prey, which makes them an important part of the food chain. They provide a vital source of food for several species, as well as helping to control populations of others. They are also considered an indicator species as they are very sensitive to changes in their environment (both aquatic and terrestrial) and their permeable skin makes them especially vulnerable to pollutants. Monitoring populations of indicator species can be an important way to pick up on early warning signs of environmental changes or damage to natural habitats and ecosystems.

There are only four native species of frog in the UK of which two are toads. Toads are a type of frog but they have shorter legs, broader noses and drier (and bumpier) skin, which allows them to survive for longer in dry conditions compared to most other frogs. Toads also produce bufotoxin via their skin to defend themselves from predators. Unfortunately, toad populations in the UK have been steadily declining due to habitat loss, pollution and climate change. Because of this they are listed as a biodiversity priority species under the Natural Environment and Rural Communities (NERC) Act (2006).

Swanwick Lakes Nature Reserve is owned by NATS and managed in partnership with Hampshire & Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust. Several amphibians call the reserve home, including



three species of newt. They provide a vital source of food for other wildlife including herons, grass snakes and badgers, plus dragonflies and damselflies. For more information about toads and frogs please visit: www.hiwwt. org.uk/wildlife-explorer/amphibians.

Rainfall report for February/March

February was a very wet month even by normal standards; we recorded rain on 24 out of the 29 days. There were 8 days with over 10 mms and only 5 days without any rain. The 9th was the wettest day with 32.3mms (1.27"). March has been marginally better with 5 rainless days out of the first 15 and has given 56.6mms. (2.23").

January 2024 92.6mms (3.64") January 2023 139.5mms (5.49") February 2024 182.7mms (7.19") Total for January-February 2024 275.3mms The first 15 days of March 56.6mms (2.22")

For those that say it has been the wettest winter for many years from our records it is actually number seven since 1974. The wettest 'winter', December 1st to end of February was 2013-14 with 717 mm, compared to our 420mm this 'winter'.



He was sentenced to death, but this was changed to life imprisonment for 20 years after which he was released on licence. We all throughly enjoyed our afternoon!

A-Frames for publicising events

WMPC has recently been made aware that the land at the post box (opposite the butcher's) belongs to Hampshire Highways and, therefore, if parishioners wish to display an A-Frame they will first have to obtain a licence from Winchester City Council (WCC). Please contact WCC on 01962 840 222 for further details of how to obtain a licence. WMPC will amend its A-Frame and Banner Advertising policy accordingly. Banners for display at The Cross will still need permission from WMPC and are permitted for a maximum period of two weeks.

New play equipment at the Recreation Ground

WMPC is pleased that the new play equipment is being installed and hopefully will be ready for use in April. More news will be found on 'We Are West Meon', on completion. WMPC is still deciding the future of the existing small children's play area.

Report from the West Meon Safe and Sound Working Group

WMPC was pleased to receive a report from the traffic and speed group. WMPC members will read this report. The item will be on the agenda for the April/May WMPC meeting. The Chairman and Clerk thank the group for their ongoing work.

Traffic speed monitoring

Related to the item above, WMPC are investigating the installation of a moveable speed monitoring device that can be installed at differing locations in the parish to gather data on vehicle speeds. This is part of WMPC's response to parishioners' concerns about traffic flow and speeds across the parish.

Stagecoach bus service 67 and the Meon Valley Community Bus

Parishioners will know of the threat to the 67 bus service after April 2025. WMPC is continuing to lobby HCC to maintain their support for this service. WMPC is also considering how it can work with other parish councils in the Meon Valley and on the route of the 67 bus to maintain the public bus service or make increased use of the Meon Valley Community Bus. **Flooding in West Meon**

Parishioners know that the amount of rain this year has brought weeks of road and property flooding, especially at East End. WMPC is moving to employ a hydrologist to investigate the flood risk and make recommendations for reducing risk and actions riparian land owners can take to alleviate some flooding.

West Meon Village Hall Car Park

WMPC is applying to SDNP CIL funding for monies to help increase the size of the car park at the Village Hall. This would involve removing the existing small children's play area and relocating it to provide new car parking space. This process would not happen immediately as planning permissions and plans etc would need to be drawn up. However, WMPC is aware of the pressure on the car park and is looking to take action.
