Maranatha!

Last year, I wrote about keeping the spirit of Christmas alive for a whole season – and not just until 12th night – the eve of the Epiphany when we celebrate the Magi and their gift-bearing visit to the Holy Family – but right up until Candlemas (2nd February). But this year, which seems to have flown by, my mind is on the run-up to Christmas. Soon, we shall reach the Winter Solstice and slowly the hours of daylight will increase, but before the days lengthen very much at all, many of us will be getting ready for Christmas, as the supermarkets have been reminding us to do for what seems like months.

You may recall me writing about another ancient feast-day associated with gift-giving last year – the Feast of St Nicholas (Santa Claus), which falls on 6th December. One of the acts of care and kindness remembered about this ancient saint was his generosity to those in need and not least to children and young people.

You may also recall that we launched an appeal early in December to coincide with St Nicholas' Day asking for gifts of toys, wrapped and given anonymously for children whose

The response across West Meon and Warnford, with East Meon and Langrish, and from the two local village schools was incredible! Given that it was the first year of the appeal, the generosity was way beyond my wildest dreams, so much so that we needed two cars to transport all the gifts to Portsmouth.

I very much hope that similar Nicholas-tide generosity will become one of our local fixtures – a new tradition in the making. So, please join in the generosity again this year and help us collect more toys for children whose Christmas will be in the E C Roberts Centre in Portsmouth, rather than at home. Bring some happiness to those children, and joy into your heart, by giving with willingness.

The toys, mostly brand-new, were distributed to children, who would otherwise have to spend their Christmases in women's refuges or in homeless hostels - escaping violence and abuse, but with very little other joy. Last year we asked specifically for toys for children and that remains our main priority, but one or two people asked about small gifts such as hand-cream, I am sure that such gifts would also be appreciated. Please wrap your gift and label it only with an indication of the intended age-range of the toy, an anonymous greeting on the outside or on a label is also absolutely fine. We were also given some, generally larger, pre-used toys and these were given to the Roberts Centre itself for Children to use in the centre throughout the year.

As I mentioned last year, giving as Nicholas did, anonymously will bring many homeless children such great joy, but for understandable reasons, no water pistols or other toy weapons, which may bring painful memories to mind for some children or their mothers.


Please drop the gifts into any of the Benefice Churches right up until 16th December or bring them to any of our services between now and that date and please do tell others about our appeal – it makes a real difference to so many children. Thank you for your wonderful generosity last year and thank you again in advance for an even bigger response this year.

Keeping the run-up to Christmas in mind, the new church year begins four Sundays before Christmas Day on Advent Sunday, and although Advent Calendars often begin on 1st December, this year Advent Sunday fell on 30th November.

For Christians Advent is a season of expectation and preparation, as the Church prepares to celebrate the coming of Christ into the world as the baby Jesus, but also looks ahead to the end of time when all will be made perfect and at one with God's Kingdom. Our readings direct us towards Christ's birth, but they also challenge us to reflect and to turn away from all that harms us or indeed the world. But, the characteristic note of Advent is therefore expectation, rather than penitence, although the character of the season is easily coloured by an analogy with Lent. Returning to my comment about supermarket advertising earlier, the anticipation of Christmas under commercial and social pressure has also made it harder to sustain the appropriate sense of alert watchfulness. To be fair, supermarkets are far from alone in placing huge expectations on people at Christmas. So I hope church can be a haven from some of that pressure, while remaining a place of joyful expectant celebration. For us, the fundamental Advent prayer must remain 'Maranatha' – 'Our Lord, come' (1 Corinthians 16.22).

Although church decorations are simple, the Advent season falls at the darkest time of the year, and so we can exploit the natural symbols of darkness and light throughout Advent and Christmas.

The lighting of candles on an Advent wreath has been common practice in church and



Rainfall report for October to mid-November

The second half of October was dry until the 19th when we had a downpour of almost an inch (24.03mms) It then rained every day for the rest of the month ending with 100.6mms (3.96"). By contrast November has been, with the exception of two days, wet, giving a total of 57.8mm (2.27").

This year rainfall in total to the 15th has been 723mm (28.5) and last year we had 970mm (38.2"), 247mm (9.7") more. On our 50 year average we would have had about 800mm (31.5") by mid November. On all counts it is a dry year and to highlight this the river has only just started to flow again in West Meon having been dry for almost five months, while through East Meon village it has just flowed all summer.

The Holm Oak - The Cross

A report by a professional Arboricultural Consultant has been sought with respect to options to address the visible damage and cracking that is being caused to the retaining boundary wall of the listed central monument and feature of "The Cross" by the Holm Oak root system. Circa 15 years ago the parish council helped to fund expensive renovations to the brick and flint wall, cap stones and railings which have to be maintained as a part of the listing.

As a result West Meon PC is planning to submit a planning application to have the oak replaced with a smaller native tree. It has rather unfortunately significantly outgrown its

It is striking to note how tree and shrub growth has transformed this view over a relatively short period. Instead of forming a backdrop to a visually cohesive building group, as before, planting has now almost entirely obscured the cottages behind The Cross



location and is causing damage in addition to substantively changing and over dominating the central village vista, in a way that was not envisaged when it was originally planted as a much smaller tree in the 1970's.

On the 13th November Martyn Cox, award-winning garden writer, TV presenter, and all-round horticultural enthusiast, gave a very interesting and exciting talk about clever ways to grow vegetables.



He suggested a good selection of plants to enliven our gardens - from including them in your border as edible and decorative plants (chilli pepper "purple flash") to good plants for containers or hanging baskets (tomato "hundreds and thousands"). He also informed us about how to maximise space in small gardens, such as with vertical gardening.

Looking forward to next year, our lively programme of events for 2026 includes a series of talks by engaging presenters through the year such as Amanda Gomersall on creating an award winning garden from weeds, our very own Stephen Short and his team, talking about their work as River Meon Conservation Volunteers and Edwin Grimshaw on life above and below stairs in the 19th Century. Rustles in the leaves

As autumn brings misty mornings and crisp evenings, one of our most familiar garden visitors - the European hedgehog (Erinaceus europaeus) - is preparing for its long winter sleep. These round, brown mammals, famously covered in around 7,000 yellow-tipped spines, are a much-loved feature of Britain's wildlife and an important part of our natural heritage.

Often called the gardener's best friend, hedgehogs are expert nocturnal foragers. They emerge at dusk to snuffle through long grass, flowerbeds, leaf litter, and vegetable patches in search of worms, beetles, slugs, and other invertebrates, making them natural pest controllers. Hedgehogs have a keen sense of smell and a remarkable ability to remember the location of abundant food sources.

Mostly active from April to October, they thrive in a variety of habitats, including woodland edges, farmland, parks, and suburban gardens, wherever shelter and food are plentiful. Solitary creatures for most of the year, they roam several miles each night in search of food and mates, coming together only during the breeding season in late spring and early summer.

By this time of year, hedgehogs are busy feeding as much as possible to build up fat reserves before hibernation begins. As temperatures drop in November, they retreat to sheltered spots such as under sheds, log piles, or dense shrubs, creating a nest of leaves and twigs known as a hibernaculum. Inside, their heartbeat slows dramatically and their body temperature drops, allowing them to survive for months without food.

Sadly, the familiar hedgehog is now facing real challenges. Once a common sight in gardens across the UK, numbers have declined sharply over recent decades. Habitat loss, pesticide use, and busy roads have all taken their toll, leaving hedgehogs struggling to find safe places to feed and hibernate.

Fortunately, small actions at home can make a big difference. Hampshire & Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust recommends leaving areas of long grass, creating safe corridors between gardens, and avoiding harmful chemicals, all help provide the refuge hedgehogs need. Every connected green space can become part of a larger, life-saving network for this cherished species. With a bit of care and community effort, we can help ensure hedgehogs remain a welcome part of our gardens for generations to come.

The fight to protect the South Downs for future generations



Last month more than 200 organisations wrote to the government urging them not to weaken or remove a legal duty to support National Parks and their nature and landscapes and, following a meeting with Vanessa Rowlands, Chair of the National Park Authority, Winchester MP Danny Chambers presented a petition with over 1,200 signatures to the government. It came after it was mooted that the government was considering amendments to the Planning and Infrastructure Bill that could water down the duty, downgrading consideration for National Parks among partners and developers. On 13th October, it was confirmed that the government was not pressing ahead with the idea.

Vanessa Rowlands, Chair of the National Park Authority, said: "As our very first National



Parks look toward a celebration of 75 years since their designation next year, repealing such a hard-fought duty now would have been completely out of step with Government's ambitions for nature recovery, climate resilience and wider 30by30 targets. "It is vital that such proposals remain off the table and the duty can continue to enable partnership, collaboration and cross-government working throughout these cherished landscapes." And Vanessa added: "This is a galvanising moment – an opportunity to reflect on the purpose of the strengthened duty. In legal terms it should influence how public bodies approach planning applications in Protected Landscapes. But really, the dream is

something much more fundamental than that. It should be a catalyst for deeper, more positive partnership working between Protected Landscapes and the public organisations that operate within them. "We need to keep pushing for these designated areas to be recognised as the vital environmental assets for the nation that they truly are. Places delivering essential ecosystem services and nurturing growth that's measured not in profit, but in natural capital. A holistic approach that benefits both people and nature."

The current government has declared the protection and enhancement of National Parks to be vital to its mission to restore nature and boost the nation's health through access to green spaces.

Allen Gallery

The Allen Gallery in Church Street, Alton was successful in receiving funding from multiple sources, including the National Lottery Heritage Fund, East Hampshire District Council and Alton Town Council for a redevelopment. The redevelopment project started in May 2025 and the project team at Hampshire Cultural Trust are now planning for the scheduled capital works to begin in early 2026.

This ambitious project will transform the Allen Gallery into a more welcoming, accessible and inspiring space for everyone, with new displays, a dedicated community area, and a programme of ceramics-inspired creative workshops and activities for all ages.

The schedule of capital works being undertaken will mean a period of closure for this work to be carried out which will be as follows:

- End of December 2025: The Allen Gallery closes to the public
- Throughout 2026: work is carried out at the venue
- Early 2027: The gallery will reopen to the public.

During the closed period there will be a range of community programmes and creative activities, much of which will take place at the Curtis Museum and other local venues. These will include family workshops, volunteering opportunities, and special events designed to bring people together and celebrate Alton's heritage.
